SIGNIFICANCE OF MUHARRAM AND SAFAR

The months of Muharram and Safar are of great significance for Muslimeen. . Muharram means forbidden in Arabic, referring to the forbidden nature of warfare during this month. This first month of the Islamic calendar is a month of reflection and grieving. It is thought that Prophet Muhammad (SAW) referred Muharram as the "Sacred Month of Allah" and the month of Muharram is steeped in both religious and historical significance for Shias, remembering the martyrdom of the Holy Prophet's grandson Imam Hussain Ibn Ali (A), his companions, and his family.

Imam Hussain (A) was martyred at the Battle of Karbala, taking place on the day of Ashura (the 10th of muharram) in 680 AD as the Imam stood for justice in the face of the tyrant ruler Yazid and his army.. Shias grieve and recall the fortitude of the Prophet's family in their love for the Imam and to recognize his great sacrifice in saving the religion of Islam.

Islam's survival and blessings are associated with the months of Muharram and Safar. The tribulations endured by the women and children of Imam Hussain's family are described throughout the following month, Safar and the shahadat of Bibi Sakina (A), Imam Hasan (A) and Hazrat Zaid Ibn Ali (A). During Safar, the family, specifically the women and children of Banu Hashim were treated very harshly upon entering Damascus. After being left outside the gates for 3 days they were taken near Yazeed's castle where they were held captive. In these times, we remember Hazrat Sajjad and Bibi Zainab's famous speeches at Yazeed's castle that have left an impression upon our ummah till this day.

ARBAEEN: A HUMAN PHENOMENA LIKE NONE OTHER

Every year, forty days after the tenth of Muharram, millions of Muslims from all over the world walk from Najaf to Karbala (nearly 80 km) for Arbaeen. Following a week-long journey where people of all ages and backgrounds gather for the purpose of commemorating the tragedy of Karbala, Arbaeen (literally translating to, "forty" in Arabic) is one of the most important days in every islamic year.

What's fascinating about the Arbaeen walk is the organization of such a large body of people during a single journey from Najaf to Karbala. Beginning from Jabir ibn Abdullah al-Ansari's pilgrimage to the holy grave of Imam Hussain (a.s) in 61 AH, today over millions of people have been making the walk, a symbol of unity that continues to this day. In just 2019 alone, 14 million people attended the pilgrimage, and while the numbers were hindered by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and 2021, thousands of people still journeyed towards Karbala during that time.

But Arbaeen's significance isn't just within the sheer number of people who fly from all over the world to brave the walk. It's also the people who make the journey comfortable and possible-the volunteers lining the 80km walk passing out free food, water, housing, and massages for weary travelers. To them, passing out hot food and giving respite to Za'ireen walking towards Karbala is a privilege and a blessing. It's an opportunity they prepare for in the month prior to Arbaeen. This display of selflessness all for the sake of Imam Hussain is Arbaeen's most phenomenal quality.

This year Arbaeen is said to fall within September. In the upcoming days, Momineen all over the world attend majalis in honor of Imam Hussain and his companions, while volunteers begin to prepare for the blessed journey from Najaf to Karbala.

But I was beyond grateful for the moments brought about by my decision to take the ziyarat raffle ticket, agree to be Hamza's companion, and catch a flight to


Student Featured Poetry

ISRAEL DROPS AIR STRIKES IN GAZA CITY

In their biggest attack since last year, Israel plummeted Gaza with airstrikes in early August, killing twenty-nine and wounding many. Most of the rockets sent in retaliation were intercepted, as Israeli civilians ran to bomb shelters with no signs of serious casualties reported. Just a few days before, Israel had stopped transporting fuel into Gaza's lone power plant. Already understaffed and underfunded, hospitals are preparing for frequent loss of power and supplies, setting the occupied region into a state of panic as more and more wounded civilians seek treatment. Palestinian children suffering from mental and physical health issues are at a severe disadvantage - with four out of five suffering from depression, sixty percent anemic, and ninety-five percent without access to clean water. Kids who have known nothing but airstrikes, rubble, and fear all their lives have been severely traumatized, and desperately need mental health support; something that can be accessed just a few miles away but still isn't available to them due to Israeli occupation.

In May of 2021 similar attacks sparked worldwide protest from Muslims and non-Muslims alike, as people ran to social media, news outlets, and the streets to learn about Palestine and its tragedy. It is clear that such an outrage has not been the response this year, but it is still necessary for any proponent of justice to keep fighting for the Palestinians and the injustice brought upon them.

ALBUEQUERQUE SHIA SHOOTINGS

Four murders, Four Muslims dead, All within 10 months in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Once again, American Muslims are faced with the threat of Islamophobia- but this time it's a little different.

Three of the Muslim men were shot over a 10-day period that resulted in the Muslim community in Albuquerque growing fearful of a serial killer on the loose with a strong distaste for Islam.

On August 9th 2022, police in New Mexico arrested a 51year-old by the name of Muhammad Syed in relation to the murder of the 4 Muslims dead and while his motive is still unclear, many claim he held hatred for Shia Muslims due to 3 of the murdered identifying as Shia. Some reports have suggested the possibility that Syed, a Sunni Muslim, had targeted his victims over anger that his daughter had married a Shia Muslim. "Detectives have discovered evidence that shows the offender knew the victims to some extent and an interpersonal conflict may have led to the shootings," a police statement said.

Syed is a well known community member and would actively visit the local mosque. "For months, this guy was praying next to other members of the community as if everything was normal," said Leena Aggad, the 23-year-old vice president of the University of New Mexico's Muslim Student Association.

Syed has been officially charged for 2 of the 4 murders and police say he is the primary suspect in the other 2 killings. He was arrested during a traffic stop more than 100 miles from Albuquerque according to authorities. Reports say he was on his way to the city of Houston.

As of now, he has denied connection to the shootings.



SALMAN RUSHDIE ATTACKED AT CONFERENCE

Rushdie one of the Salman is most controversial personalities in the past 30 years. In 1988, he published a book called The Satanic Verses, a book insulting many prominent Islamic figures including Prophet Muhammad. The publishing of this book lead to widespread protests around the Muslim world. A year later, Avatollah Khomeini issued a fatwa that Salman Rushdie was wajib-e-gatl. Someone who is wajib e gatl is liable to be killed, but you as an individual aren't obliged to do so. On August 12th, Salman Rushdie was stabbed while giving a speech in New York.

The perpetrator, Hadi Matar, was identified as a Shia. He also announced his support for Ayatollah Khamenei in an interview. Many were quick to celebrate the stabbing, excited to see Rushdie die once and for all. But was this the right move for the image of Islam?

The sales of the book surged after the stabbing, just like they did in 1989 after the original fatwa was released. The stabbing was a failed murder attempt and didn't even kill Rushdie and now he likely will have a larger platform to speak against Islam. Iran claimed no responsibility for the attack and Matar also stated that he acted alone.

There was still some confusion about whether or not the fatwa was still in effect. In 1998, former Iranian president Mohammed Khatami said that the Iranian regime no longer supported the killing of Salman Rushdie.

However, a fatwa cannot be dropped. When asked a question about whether or not the fatwa is still in effect Ayatollah Khamenei stated, "The decree is as Imam Khomeini (ra) issued." This eliminates any questions of whether or not the fatwa still stands today.

After the stabbing, there was public outrage. People rushed to Rushdie's defense. Many said that Rushdie had the right to freedom of expression. However this double standard is not to be taken seriously; if the book were to be critiquing Judaism, or daresay insulting Judaism, would it too be considered freedom of speech? Would critiquing western ideologies that defy everything we believe and stand for be considered freedom of speech? The west's disdain for our religion is intolerable. The question is what we will do to represent our religion as the religion of Rasulullah (SAW).
